Four books were reviewed by the group this month. A brief description is included to whet your appetite for further reading.

#### 'Lessons in Chemistry' by Bonnie Garmus.

This is a multi-award-winning best seller, described

as unconventional and funny. It is set in America in the 50s and 60s. The main character is Elizabeth Zott, a brilliant research scientist working in a facility where she is the only woman and is badly treated. She meets Calvin, a fellow scientist and becomes pregnant. There is an incident that leads to her leaving the lab, pregnant and alone. Surprisingly she becomes well known as a TV chef.

#### Monica Ali's book 'Love Marriage'

Set in England in the 70s and 80s, it is a story of two young lovers from two very different cultures. Yasmin, from a Muslim family, is a student doctor who becomes engaged to Joe. When her family meet his there is a struggle for them all to understand each other. Joe's mother Harriet, writes books and essays on liberal guilt, throws parties for the literati and once famously posed nude for a published photo. Yasmin's family are conservative and very traditional. At the first family dinner Yasmin's mother brings copious amounts of Indian food in Tupperware to Harriet's lavish catered dinner. The stage is set for misunderstandings and conflict. Yasmin begins to question what she wants from a relationship.

#### 'This must be the Place' is by Maggie O'Farrel.

The two main characters are Claudette, a well-known film star and Daniel Sullivan, an Irish American from Brooklyn. Claudette has a mental crisis, leaves her career and husband and disappears with her young son. By chance Daniel meets her when her car breaks down in remote rural Ireland and a love affair ensues. Daniel has a family in America including his father and his children. After some years of happiness together Daniel goes to his father's funeral in America and makes the mistake of looking for a previous girlfriend from his past. Trouble follows.

#### 'Annie Dunne' by Sebastian Barry

This novel introduces a family that he then writes about further in a series of books. Not a lot happens but the writing is beautiful.

Annie was born to a relatively wealthy family in Ireland, her grandfather was a senior policeman working for the English which causes some alienation from her Irish neighbours. Because of the political turmoil in Ireland in the early part of the 20th century the family wealth is lost. Annie is hunchbacked and had no suitors as a young woman, her family takes advantage of her and generally she is mistreated and bitter.

After being evicted from her brother's home, when he remarried, she goes to live with her unmarried cousin Sarah, also an old lady. The novel describes their hard life on a small holding in remote Ireland, milking cows, making butter, keeping hens and struggling financially. More insecurity for Annie threatens when Billy Kerr, a farmhand shows interest in marrying Sarah. - Carol


